Hopefully it will easily signal our inventory needs so you can help us maintain a steady supply.



Mission Feedback — Dominican Republic

Excerpts from a report by Dr. Larry Otten, Optometrist



Mira Hacia Afuera "look outside" became my newly learned phrase of Español. I spent my first two days of eye clinic at two schools performing my eye examinations on a total of 375 students and 10 staff members. I became very efficient examining about 30 people per hour. Each patient received a pupil exam, eye motility, and cover testing to determine if the eyes were straight. I also performed an inside look into the eye with my ophthalmoscope, and an objective refraction with my retinoscope and lens bars.

I joined the rest of the medical/dental team on days 3, 4 and 5. As was the situation last year, I was in a comfortable ventilated classroom above the chaos and confusion of the clinic down-stairs. Here we set up visual acuity testing, an examination area for me, and an optical dispensing area.

My official patient count for the week was 657.

It takes a lot of people to keep the Northwest Lions Eyeglass Recycling Center operating and running smoothly.

It is quite an operation when you have a full house of **volunteers** performing all of the tasks needed to deliver first-class eyeglasses for our mission requests. People are sorting through cruddy old dirty glasses; others are washing and further examining the glasses; while still others are manning the lensometers to determine prescriptions.

Someone you may or may not notice while all of this going on is the **site manager**. The site manager decides what needs to be done and works with the volunteers who will do it. The site manager also keeps track of volunteer hours, glasses received and shipped, and all issues involved with operations during their shift.

Another position people may not be aware of, or don't realize the importance of, is our **Directors**. Although these people are not involved in the daily operations, they are what links our operations center to the Lions throughout the Multiple District who are so crucial to our success. When information needs to get to the clubs, it is sent to our Directors who send it via their zones to the clubs. The Directors are the vital link between the daily operations of the LERC and the Lions of MD 19 without whom LERC would not exist.

There are others who are vital to our operation who receive little or no recognition:

Our **treasurer Lyell**, who makes sure all of our money is in the proper account and ensures all expenditures are properly documented and dispersed. He also has the monumental task of managing the taxes and other financial issues of a nonprofit.

Pat Bucknell wears many hats in maintenance, operations and pretty much anything that needs attention or repair. Pat supervises the shipments to our recycler and all work done by our landscapers and mole catcher. He is able to repair things as fast as we can break them.

Finally, **Berta and Jean, our mission coordinators**, manage to make sense of all the glasses after we have sorted, washed and sealed them into neat little bags. These are categorized, packed, and ready to go when a mission request comes in.

This is what it is all about. We gather glasses, sort them, clean them, determine prescriptions and bag them up to be delivered to needy people throughout the world. It takes a lot of people to make the NWLERC what it is today. Some are less conspicuous than others, but everyone pulling together makes it work and every contribution is essential.
